### C. DIFFICILE ROOM CLEANING

#### **POLICY:**

Proper cleaning procedures of resident rooms in additional precautions for Clostridium Difficile will be used to reduce the potential spread of infection. PIDAC Best Practices for *Environmental Cleaning for Prevention and Control of Infections in All Health Care Settings* will provide the guidance for specific processes.

#### PROCEDURE:

Follow the same cleaning procedure outlined in *Policy and Procedure: Routine Daily Cleaning of Resident Rooms* with the exception of these changes:

- **Twice daily** cleaning and disinfection of resident rooms and bathroom in additional precautions C. difficile rooms are required.
- Use a fresh bucket and mop head (dust mop and wet mop) for each room on C. Difficile precautions, and ONLY that room.
- All surfaces in the room and bathroom including the floors are to be cleaned with sporicidal cleaner Accel Rescue contact time is 10 minutes to kill spores. No other cleaner is to be used. This product is ready-to-use and does not require dilution. Gloves and goggles are to be worn when handling Accel Rescue.
- After surfaces remain wet for 10 minutes, they should be rinsed to remove all product residue.

When a resident is discharged or transferred and was on isolation for C. Difficile, follow the same room cleaning procedure listed above with the addition of tasks outlined in *Policy and Procedure: Discharge/Transfer Cleaning of Resident Room*. As well, discard and replace soap, toilet paper, paper towel, and toilet brush.

If there are multiple cases of C. difficile infections on the same floor:

- Disinfect all high-touch surfaces and equipment on the unit with the sporicidal cleaner
   Accel Rescue
- When each patient/resident is discharged or transferred, consider disinfecting their bed/bed space with a sporicide, regardless of the patient/resident's C. difficile infection status.
